## Letter from the Rectory, Much Hadham

*"Whatsoever is spoken of God, or things appertaining to God, otherwise than as the truth is, though it seems an honour, it is an injury. And as incredible praises given unto men do often abate and impair the credit of their deserved commendation; so we must likewise take great heed, lest, in attributing unto Scripture more than it can have, the incredibility of that do cause even those things which it hath most abundantly, to be less reverently esteemed." – Richard Hooker, "Laws of ecclesiastical polity".*

Let me translate: "Claim too much, and you may lose everything, even the most valuable and vital that you have to give."

To many people the disagreements within the Anglican Church will seem as obscure and irrelevant as the quotation. But what I love about this passage is that it summarises for me the strength of the Anglican way of Christian believing. It is written out of great faith and devotion to the Bible, but with a sense of reason and good judgement. Some may say that it lacks passion; but I say that it has the passion and the power of inspired good sense. In a world that is driven by passionate extremes, whether of society or religion, the need for a Christian middle way to steer us through the storms and conflicts that our passions bring; is not only desirable; but essential.

If the Anglican Communion is in crisis that is not surprising, given that we have always been in crisis. Consider our history: Born out of a sexual scandal and the need for a royal divorce; used by a succession of politicians to underwrite their power; exploited as an arm of the Establishment; carried across continents by colonial expansion; subject from time to time to internal theological division; the whipping boy of radicals and conservatives; compromised through involvement with elite education; maintaining a parish system in the 21st century that was devised in the tenth; the wonder is that we have survived this long!

The fact that we have is partly due to our adaptability, partly to our diversity, partly to our common sense; and wholly to the will of God. We should not be afraid of conflicting views, only of conflict.

The Church of England benefits from a world-wide perspective in that we can share with Christians trying to live a Christian life in very different conditions. For example, the Church in Nigeria and Archbishop Peter Akinola's stand against homosexuality and liberal theology cannot be appreciated until we understand the history of the Nigerian Anglican church, its foundation through CMS by Bishop Crowther, the influence of evangelical teaching through the Niger Mission and Keswick Convention; its oppression, its poverty and struggle with the direct challenge of Islam.

Katharine Jefferts Schori, his archiepiscopal rival from the USA is, for a start, a woman, a scientist, air pilot, an oceanographer, and a convert from a Roman Catholic Family in Florida. She has been Bishop in Nevada, a state with an 8 billion dollar turnover, the fastest growing ethnic population in America, and embracing the gambling capital of the world, Las Vegas. With its foundation in the social gospel movement of the 20th century and open attitudes to sexuality little wonder that there has been no meeting of minds between these two leaders.

I hope and pray that we Anglicans will continue to stay together as a rag-bag of saints and sinners, flawed and often misguided; and that we shall never claim too much for ourselves, lest we lose everything, even the valuable things we have to offer.

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## The future Church

Many of us accept the church as a place we visit in times of great happiness and rejoicing; weddings, baptisms and, at Christmas, for carol services. We also depend on the church when hardship strikes or at a time of sadness; a death in the family or of a friend; a matrimonial problem or a world disaster.

In all these instances the Church, its priests and members are there to help, befriend and provide a place for quiet contemplation and prayer.

For seven or eight centuries St Cecilia's has been a central point in our village for all these events and has witnessed a wide range of celebrations or outpourings of grief. We know the church is there – and open each and every day throughout the year – and we may have come to take it for granted.

What, though, would we think and how would we react if the church suddenly closed its doors; no more services were held and that place of refuge was no longer available to provide for our deeper, emotional needs? Weddings and other long-established and much-loved festivals would have to be held elsewhere, and then we might well wish we had seen trouble brewing.

Let us be warned! Nationally the church is under attack, as witnessed in the media. In a local context, financial difficulties, together with a general shortage of priests, are placing the continued work of St Cecilia's under great pressure.

Support by attendance and giving of time and money will help to ensure that in another 700/800 years our children's children will enjoy the peace and fulfilment provided by the Church. If you already make regular donations to St Cecilia's you may now wish to increase the amount you give in 2007, or you may like to start giving. 
## Cricket, anyone?



Remember recycling just ONE aluminium can saves enough energy to watch three hours of television – that's an entire episode of "Dancing on Ice" and the results programme – so please

remember: put all your food and drink cans, pet food cans, aerosols, biscuit and sweet tins and household cleaning product tins in your green box for East Herts Council to collect.

Recycling ONE glass bottle saves enough energy to power your home computer for 20 minutes - just enough time for you to check your e-mails. So please remember to recycle all your jam jars and sauce bottles, wine and beer bottles and other empty glass jars and bottles in your green box.

Just think - SEVEN days after you've recycled your paper it could be back on the shelves of your local newsagent ready for you to buy again. Please recycle all of your white paper. 

written in 1966 by Mr Fredk. George Harris, aged 70)

A very busy building with work for the village people. The farm worker after having a barrel of beer or two 9 gall casks at 1/- a gallon. After harvest all the men gathered to the brewery for a Dinner also plenty of Bread and cheese they made a enjoyable day of [it]. Waggon and horses with their ribbons and brasses on carried many a full harvest worker home.

It was said a 30 round lader was kept at the Brewery. If one borrowed it for their own use when taking it back there always was a pint of beer when it was return, needless to say that lader was always on the move.

When the new wing was put on the Chapel school An old custom was to pay 1/2 gallon of beer to the workman if one laid a brick on the building concern. That wing is full of Beer bricks as every one wanted a go. The result a trip across the road to the Brewery for 1/2 gallon of beer for 9d so more bricks were well wetted.

## That second Runway – an exhibition

IF STANSTED'S SECOND RUNWAY ever went ahead, for Little Hadham: think Slough! It's important that as many people as possible attend an exhibition on 4th April and ask BAA some tough questions. Here are three:

- *HOW CAN YOU JUSTIFY* dumping on our doorstep an airport that would be bigger than Heathrow today when the majority of passengers would be using Stansted simply for cheap holidays in Europe?
- *HOW WILL THIS AREA* cope with 68 million passengers (more than three times today's) with no plans to improve roads and trains or pay for them?
- *WHEN SCIENTISTS AGREE* we have just ten years to tackle the cataclysmic effects of global climate change, how can Stansted justify a second runway that would add another 5 million tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> (the gas that causes global warming), more than doubling the airport's current emissions?




