Letter from Chris Boulton

Several kind people have congratulated me on becoming Rural Dean; and I begin the role in October. I am sure that some have no idea what a Rural Dean is for, or even what constitutes a rural deanery, so I thought the following explanation might help.

From the twelfth and thirteenth centuries dioceses were divided into archdeaconries and these were in turn divided into rural deaneries which held groups of parishes. The term "rural" is a misnomer for many areas today, since they stretch across cities and towns. The deaneries vary enormously in character and size across the whole Church of England. However, "rural" was originally used to distinguish these units from the dean and chapter of the cathedral of the diocese. The system of rural deaneries was in abeyance from the sixteenth to the early nineteenth century when it was revived.

Our particular deanery consists of sixteen separate parishes, eleven of which are truly rural and the rest lie in the town settings of Bishop's Stortford and Sawbridgeworth.

My job will be to visit them occasionally on behalf of the Archdeacon, to inspect their records and informally ask the churchwardens how things are going. I will offer them support and guidance if required, especially during an interregnum. Another vital part of the task is to support and encourage the rest of the clergy in the deanery. I also co-chair the deanery synod meetings where clergy and lay representatives meet several times a year.

So, being rural dean is a straightforward but rewarding position. I hope I will bring to it the same enthusiasm and dedication that I try to show in parish ministry, and that it will be an adjunct to that ministry, bringing new insights and contacts. It is important that both church and secular communities in every area try to work across boundaries and understand each other better, so that benefits can be shared and community built up. I think it is especially good that town and country understand each other's concerns more fully and cooperate on common needs.

Meanwhile I remain just the same Chris, but maybe a touch busier than before!

Police on alert over drugs

Police have been alerted to alleged drug dealing taking place in the car park of the Village Hall. At the September meeting of the Parish Council, it was reported that Police patrols will pay particular attention to the car park.

Two car break-ins have also been reported. In one incident valuable items were stolen from a vehicle left unlocked. Irritation caused by noisy motorbikes, some of which are not street legal or ridden in an unsafe manner by children, were also reported at the meeting. The Parish Council is to have more regular contact with the new Police team covering Little Hadham.

Residents whose properties border pavements in the village are asked by the Parish Council to ensure that **hedges and borders** are kept cut. Overhanging hedges, shrubs and nettles force pedestrians to walk dangerously near the kerb or in the road.

The council is to tackle **rat-running** through Cradle End, Bury Green and Ford Hill. A petition signed by residents affected by speeding traffic in these narrow lanes

Pitch in YOUR ideas

Following the highly successful opening of our brand new playground next to the Village Hall, thoughts are turning to how we can make best use of the rest of the play area, currently a rather sad soccer pitch. The Parish Plan committee would like to have your ideas.

The two suggestions so far are to make it into a proper five-a-side football pitch by re-locating the goalposts and marking it out, or creating a tennis court. Both have the advantages of attracting players of all ages and offering fun and exercise. Other options being explored are a dual-purpose soccer field and grass tennis court, or an all-weather surface that could be used for more than one sport. All these ideas would require a safety net to stop balls going over the hedge.

It would be great to have a Little Hadham soccer league or a tennis club, and a good opportunity to link the playing field with the Village Hall, which could be used for changing facilities.

There may be a 'starter fund' for some work but the village would need to raise substantial money for the more ambitious ideas. What do you think – this could be YOUR club? FOOTPATH UPDATE 2007

Over the past 12 months, in my role as Footpath Secretary, I have walked every footpath in Much Hadham and Little Hadham at least once. I have also carried out an analysis of all the footpaths and created a file giving the number, start point, end point, and distance for each footpath. In each of the 2 parishes there are 58 different footpaths with a distance of 25 miles. The Little Hadham footpaths are numbered 1 – 58, the Much Hadham footpaths 1 – 7, 9 – 59, and not even Herts CC can advise me what happened to MH Fp 8.

I consider that in the past 12 months we have seen a big improvement in the overall situation on our footpaths. There is a requirement that every footpath leading from a road or lane should have a proper signpost and a number of new signposts have been installed. If anyone knows of a footpath leading from a road or lane which does not have a signpost could you please let me know. A lot of new waymark posts and signs have been put in place including the replacements for the waymark posts vandalized in the Danebridge area. In addition, a number of stiles have either been removed or replaced by kissing gates including all the stiles in the grounds of the Henry Moore Foundation.

The weather has not helped this year with a number of paths blocked by fallen trees early in the year and some paths becoming overgrown because of the wet summer. There is not too much that we can do about overgrown paths but Herts CC have agreed to add more of our footpaths to the regular mowing schedule.

I would like to thank everybody who has advised me of problems and I can guarantee that all will be investigated and if necessary advised to Herts CC. Just as a reminder, I can be contacted on 01279 842237 for any new problems; if you are able to specify the number of the footpath then this makes my job of investigation much easier.

Walking tours of Little Hadham using our network of footpaths will be included in the Little Hadham Guide, currently being prepared as part of the Parish Plan. Mr Rogers is doing sterling work keeping footpaths up to scratch and his knowledge will be invaluable in planning walks around Little Hadham.

Surf's up! Come on in





will be presented to Herts Road and Transportation Panel with a request to find a solution.



Cricket Club News

Little Hadham Cricket Club entered the last three league matches in second place in the league table and with high hopes of promotion into Division Four. Unfortunately defeats in all these matches meant an eventual finishing position of fourth. Against fellow promotion hopefuls Braughing on the 19th August, Little Hadham were all out for 198 with Keith Wheatley stranded on 98 not out. In a tense finish Braughing eased home with just 1 over and three wickets to spare. The following Saturday Bishop's Stortford's fourth eleven were the visitors to Millfield Lane. Bishop's Stortford posted what seemed to be a very moderate score of just 167 all out in their 45 overs, however some very economical bowling from all the Stortford bowlers and a regular fall of wickets meant that Hadham made only 117 all out thereby falling short by 50 runs. The final league match of the season was away to Little Munden. Hadham batted first and scored 170 for 4, with Keith Wheatley again finishing on 98 not out. Despite losing 5 wickets Little Munden cruised home to only their second win of the season with 5 overs to spare. In friendly matches there were mixed fortunes over the past month, with a win against Buntingford, a defeat against Hatfield Heath and three draws being recorded. The three drawn matches were against Little Hallingbury, High Beach and Reed. The pick of these drawn matches was the game against High Beach when in a high scoring match High Beach batting first amassed 281 for 7. In reply Little Hadham scored a creditable 203 for 8 with Andy Robinson contributing 88.

The War Memorial

Memories of Little Hadham, 1900 -1914,
written in 1966 by Mr Fredk. George Harris, aged 70)

The stone which lays at the top point Mr Walter Gillett South Fields builder one day with two other men went to Westland Green and just on the Green on the Ford Road end near the pond. A large stone have laid there for many years Walter saying it would be his respect to the men who had fallen. 
