Letter from the Rectory

We have another new Bishop, the Bishop of Hertford, to replace Christopher Foster who left to be Bishop of Portsmouth. He is Paul Bayes; his wife is called Kate and he has three grown up children. Paul has been National Mission and Evangelism Advisor to the Church of England. For now, we have a non-controversial figure, who will bring many gifts to his role as area Bishop. We welcome him.

One day in the future perhaps another Rector will be announcing the appointment of a woman Bishop, or a gay Bishop, or both. In my time as Rector it is unlikely now that we shall have a woman Bishop in this area. Some would say that the Church of England will be so split that we will disintegrate and there will be no Rector in this place, male or female. If this is to be the case, it will not be because of arguments about gender, but because we are regarded as unnecessary and irrelevant to the community we serve. I do not know the future, but I have faith that the spirit of Anglicanism will find a place to continue.

So what was going on at the recent Synod of York?

We do already have female Bishops in the world wide Anglican Communion, and they have been well received. We already have agreed in principle to ordain women to the episcopacy in the Church of England, since the ordination of women to the priesthood had opened the way for this. There is already provision for those who cannot accept the authority or validity of the women's orders to find alternative ministry and oversight. It is too late to put the genie back in the bottle. The Archbishops wanted to provide more legal backing for "flying" male bishops to go into Dioceses and provide a stronger alternative oversight. I think they were primarily motivated by issues of unity in the wider Anglican Communion rather than the Church of England itself. But this proposal was deemed unnecessary by a majority of the clergy, since there are already plenty of male Bishops to give alternative care.

The truth is that the Anglican Communion has always been divided, or less pejoratively, diverse, in its theology and practice. In our theology of Church, of Biblical interpretation, of sacramental practice, even of basic doctrines we have argued and diverged. If now some want to make this single issue the one and only cause, then no compromise will satisfy. Some are using it as an excuse to vent their feelings about a host of other issues; all of us involved are motivated by a complex mixture of attitudes and convictions. Meanwhile most of our society doesn't care.

And that is surely the vital truth. There are so many more important matters to deal with: War, terrorism, poverty, disease, over population, environmental degradation, to name but a few. We in the Church need to keep our eye on the main reason for being; namely bringing people nearer to God and to the spirit of Jesus, and working for a time when we no longer need the Church, because the Kingdom of God will be established upon earth.

East Herts Rural Parish Conference. A colleague from the PC attended this conference in June and reported back on a number of matters raised including: funding available for new small rural business ventures £2.5m being put forward by government and the private sector; setting up of a village Youth Club more info on either of these two topics from Carmela 466331 or email cam2403@hotmail.co.uk. Hertfordshire Police were represented at the conference and confirmed that Hertfordshire is still a safe place to live; the crime rate being reduced year on year in recent years. The Local Development Framework reported that an extra 8,500 homes need to be built in East Herts by 2031, although during the current period of economic down-turn the authorities would expect progress to be slow. The PC will keep the community updated on this matter as and when new information is gleaned, it will no doubt be a long drawn out affair.

I trust that you have all been enjoying this spell of good weather, as reported elsewhere by my neighbour and hope that you are all being sensible by wearing hats, using plenty of high factor sun protection creams and drinking lots of water.

Some of you have been concerned about the recent notification regarding changes to ordering repeat prescriptions. From 1st September, following strict PCT guidance, we will no longer be taking such orders by telephone and you will not be able to leave your request on an answer phone; it has been shown repeatedly, throughout the NHS, that this is one of the main causes of medication error. You will, however, now have five ways to order your repeat prescriptions:

1. By post; 2. By using the existing drop-in-box just inside the main door; 3. When you collect your medication from the dispensary, by completing the right hand strip and leaving it with us (this option will also be available to those collecting from the branch surgeries) 4. By fax on 01279 843973; 5. By e-mail (much.hadham@nhs.net) There will be notices in all our surgeries for those that don't subscribe to their parish magazines (shame on you!!) or who live elsewhere.

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Nature Notes

from Jonathan Forgham

A period of exceptionally high temperatures and virtually no rain led to a huge increase in insect activity, with few noteworthy birds. The end of June and July are notoriously poor for bird watching and so my attention turns to dragonflies, damselflies and butterflies and the weather meant good recordings.

A new dragonfly for the parish was recorded on 11th July in the form of a male broad bodied chaser, observed along the Ash Valley south of The Ford. This was the day of my nature ramble, where 6 of us wandered around Bury Green, via Danebridge to Much Hadham before returning along footpaths along the River Ash. A super 5 hour outing with good views of 5 dragonfly species. My thanks to the owners of Hadham Barns in Bury Green for giving permission for us to enter their garden to study the insect life in and on their superb pond. Emperor dragonfly, black tailed skimmers, 4 spot chasers (shown here) and a solitary brown hawker were all noted here along with common blue and azure damselfly (shown below). Also: 10 butterfly species were discovered, including 2



marbled whites. This is an uncommon butterfly for this region but appears to be growing in numbers as I witnessed 15+ of this wonderful butterfly as I toiled with my golf on Ash Valley G.C.

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The past month has seen summer finally begin and with it ideal cricketing weather. However at 126 for 9 Hadham were again struggling until Martin Hallmark (36 not out) and last man in, David Barnes (14) put on 35 for the last wicket before David Barnes was out just 18 runs short of the target.

After a month of home games the next match was away to Barley. Batting first the home side scored 254 for 5 with David Barnes taking 3 wickets. In reply Hadham were 103 for 2 before one of the Barley fielders badly injured himself on the boundary and the match was

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) is staging the Hallingbury Hike, a special four mile circular walk, on Sunday 26 September to highlight the blight which lingers over the beautiful north west Essex countryside in the wake of the recently withdrawn plans to construct a second runway at Stansted. Hikers will set off from 2pm after a commemorative photo at the village hall in Great Hallingbury, just to the south of the airport. There is no charge for taking part. Refreshments will be available from 1pm to 5pm for departing and returning rambles and route maps will be provided.

While the area around Stansted Airport is not spectacular in the way of the Lake District or the Devon coast, it nevertheless has its own quiet, distinctive and outstanding beauty. In the words of Sir John Betjeman, writing in October 1967: "It is a quiet, prosperous, agricultural area of old stone and flint churches, pargetted cottages with red tiled roofs, spreading farms and gabled manor houses, little hills, elms, oaks, willow streams and twisty lanes leading to towns of such renowned beauty as Thaxted and Saffron Walden. The very fact that this country is so gentle, unobvious and typical of the best of England makes it all the more important that, being so near to London, it is preserved from noise and 'development'."

However, while plans for a second runway at Stansted have been scrapped for the time being, airport operator BAA is refusing to give a guarantee that it will not revisit its plans for major expansion over coming decades. This is exacerbating the blight which has hung over the area since plans to expand Stansted were mooted for the fourth time by the Government in 2002.

Do you believe we should build more jails or just allow 'lesser' criminals to face non-custodial sentences? I ask because I used to believe that jail taught offenders a lesson. I don't think that way any more because I believe jail is too cushy and seems an easy option. So let me introduce you to the Arizona Sheriff Joe Arpaio, who runs a tented city jail in the Arizona desert, where temperatures can sometimes reach 130°F.

I was first attracted to Sheriff Joe when on visiting Arizona one Christmas, I travelled the highway which runs near to his jail. There, twinkling with Christmas lights, was a "Vacancy" sign outside the entrance to his jail. Joe believes in making life hard for his inmates. He started chain gangs, so the men could do free work on county and city projects. And yes, they march, chained together, wearing the arrowed uniforms we used to see in films. I've seen them. Then he started chain gangs for women so he wouldn't get sued for discrimination.

Jail meals cost 30p, and prisoners must pay for them. He doesn't allow smoking, coffee or porno magazines. He stopped cable TV until he found this was against a federal court order, so he re-instated it but only allows the Disney and the Weather channel. When the 2,000 inmates complained, he told them if they didn't like it, "then don't come back!"

More recently he has taken over the job of caring for the stray animals in the region. It used to cost the County £18 million dollars. Now prisoners operate the animal shelters. They feed, care and walk the dogs and give classes for those wanting to adopt. The cost is now down

to \$3 million. Inmates are paid around 23p an hour – and love it – anything to get out of their tents!

Sheriff Joe is re-elected every time with huge majorities – last year it was 83% of the vote. OK, so I don't quite see why he makes the guys wear pink boxers, pink socks and even have pink towels . . . but all the rest I think is quite brilliant.

Why can't we in the UK run a similar type of prison – where hard work and no privileges are the order of the day. Health and Safety or some other namby-pamby government department would surely not allow it. And that, in my opinion, is where it has all gone wrong.

parish boundary from Tesco's right round to Albury End, via Bury Green, Danebridge, Ash Valley, Westland Green and over the A120. In all 41 species of bird were recorded including 1 sparrow hawk, 3 bullfinches, 4 chiffchaffs, a willow warbler and the unusual sight of 2 cape teal. The latter will be escapes from an ornamental garden or wildfowl centre.

On the insect front, 12 butterfly species including the threatened small heath, 19 small tortoiseshells, 10 common blues and a single small copper, which is only my 2nd record for the parish. Both 5 spot and 6 spot burnet moths were also observed. (The former shown here)



Finally, a walk to Standon on the 18th July gave superb, if fleeting views of a tawny owl as it flew out of a hedge, nearly dislodging my hat before disappearing into an oak. A southern hawker dragonfly was a first for the year and ringlet, (shown below)



red admiral and peacock butterflies were witnessed. I am now planning my 2nd butterfly and insect walk where all are welcome. Meet at the village hall on Sunday 15th August at 11am for a walk via footpaths to Standon for refreshments at The Star before returning via Bromley and Westland Green. Lawn tips

Welcome to the first lawn hints and tips section, I am Wes of Lawnsience in Welwyn and have offered to do this column due to the current weather conditions that are hitting lawns severely. Firstly the Met Office is predicting parts of England will be at risk of drought this summer due to the unusually dry start to the year.

Dry Patch can occur in lawns after prolonged dry periods, similar to those predicted for this summer. When Dry Patch occurs, the soil in the lawn becomes coated in a waxy substance causing it to become water repellent. Once this occurs and the soil becomes hydrophobic, it is very difficult to rehydrate even after substantial rain fall. It is far better to prevent Dry Patch than treat it. A wetting agent can be applied which will aid water penetration into the soil profile, reducing surface run off in high spots and prevent puddling in low spots. It also reduces the amount of irrigation or watering needed to maintain the health of the lawn during dry periods.

Cutting your grass to the correct length is vital, the grass plant is designed to have a long leaf (1.5-2 inches) and a longer leaf is a healthier leaf. Leaving the leaves longer means more energy is taken in from sunlight meaning stronger grass and roots battling against the drought.

The previous wet and current warm weather is creating perfect conditions for the fungal disease Red Thread to infect lawns. The disease is especially severe on slow-growing turf. The first noticeable symptoms are reddish patches of grass. When infected, leaf blades are often interspersed with healthy unaffected leaf blades giving the grass a ragged appearance. In

severe cases, most leaf blades may be killed and diseased grass looks scorched or yellowed in irregularly-shaped or circular patches from 5 to 50 cm in diameter. The patches may be widely scattered or, if close together, may coalesce into larger spots; any signs of Red Thread should be sprayed with the relevant fungicide to prevent further spreading.
