Parish Council News

Aerial Runway

After much consultation with SMP (the original suppliers of the playground apparatus) LHPC is to proceed with the replacement of the cable to the aerial runway at a cost of £591.00. The work is scheduled to be carried out imminently, hopefully this equipment will be ready well before half term – fingers crossed for good weather – enjoy!

Maintenance Works @ The Playground

LHPC has asked Mike Foskett (as per his quotation) to carry out essential maintenance works to fences, etc. at the playground. Please continue to enjoy using the playground – Mr Foskett's work will not affect any aspect of having fun!

Trim Trail

LHPC has tentatively agreed to a big spend project, namely a Trim Trail, to be supplied and erected at the village playground. Some finer points will have to be ironed out before a firm order is placed with Caloo. This equipment will be equally useable by adults & children and so will prove to be a good investment for our community.

Damage to War Memorial

LHPC has agreed to go ahead and ask Mr Foskett to carry out repairs to the War Memorial which sustained another lot of damage earlier this year. Hopefully the damage will be repaired well before Remembrance Sunday in November.

Little Hadham Conservation Society

Road, Footpath and General Village Repairs

LHPC works diligently in reporting, to local authorities, any repairs it comes across in and

around our village and generally speaking action is taken quite swiftly especially if the issue is of an urgent nature. So next time you come across a local authority team working hard trying to put things right in our community it's usually because one of your friendly councillors has been on the 'phone or writing emails on everyone's behalf!

Proposed Development Plans for Stonehouse Farm

The owners of Stonehouse Farm are tentatively working towards submitting plans to EHDC/ Herts County Council with a view to creating a small development of five houses on land they own along the A120. Little Hadham school is to benefit from a donation of a parcel of land should the proposals go ahead.

Important Police Reforms

At September's meeting Kate Belinis gave a talk on what are to be substantial changes in local policing in the not too distant future. According to new government directives under the Localism Act Police Authorities will disappear and each constabulary in England & Wales is to appoint a new Police Commissioner; a salaried (£75k approx) position which will last some 3/4 years for the successful candidate. Some candidates have already been nominated however as we understand it anyone with a spare £5k can put themselves forward for the position. There are fears that unsuitable candidates may apply for the position however strict vetting processes are in place to safeguard what is to be a highly responsible job. The changes are supposed to bring people & policing closer together - the new Commissioner will be accountable directly to the people. In Little Hadham, as in other cities, towns and villages, we will get a chance to vote for a suitable

The Hadhams' History Society

On the weekend of September 8th and 9th the Forge Museum garden was a hive of activity as Society members and residents of the Hadhams came together to experience real archaeology in the form of a small test pit – or, were they there just for the tea and delicious home-made cakes?

Under the direction of Caroline Baigent a metre square of turf was removed and carefully placed on a prepared groundsheet. The soil was then trowelled away in the approved fashion by a team of would-be archaeologists and quickly (and unexpectedly!) revealed a mass of broken bricks, tiles, bottle glass and solid mortar. This was carefully cleared of all soil, pictures were taken and an accurate drawing made of the revealed level or "context". The debris was then lifted and the diggers went on removing soil to a second context. In another part of the garden, the more interesting finds were being carefully washed by a team of (mainly) children under the watchful supervision of adults. After the initial excitement of finding so much, so quickly, the remainder of the test pit proved rather disappointing, and it was decided to open another one in a different part of the garden. This revealed much less in terms of "finds" and certainly did not contain the huge amounts of building rubble that the first one did. So, eventually, on Sunday afternoon, it was decided to close down both pits, which were then carefully backfilled with soil and relaid exactly with the turf that had been removed.

The reason for the existence of the rubble in the first test pit still remains a mystery, but all agreed that the weekend had been a great success in many other ways. At the end of April, 2013, we are hoping to undertake a series of test pits across the Hadhams; so, if you feel that there may be something of historical interest in your garden and are willing to provide a site for a metre square dig, or you now feel qualified to supervise a dig yourself, please contact Caroline Baigent (01279 843177) or Cristina Harrison at the Forge Museum.

The following Monday saw yet another activity at the Forge Museum when the new Local Resources and Reading Room, funded by a grant from East Herts Council, was opened

October in the garden is full of fiery colours - in the leaves, the last flowering plants and of course the berries. The Acers (Japanese Maples) and Virginia creeper both give fantastic autumn colours where as the fruits of the Pyracanthus, Crab apples and Crataegus crus-galli (cockspur thorn) and those roses that produce beautiful hips such as Rosa 'Fru Dagmar Hastrup' provide both food for the birds and interest in the garden. Flowers that continue to thrive include Colchicum (autumn crocus / meadow saffron), Nerine bowdenii – tall stems topped by curly petalled, bright pink flowers, Dahlias until the frosts, Gazania, Rudbeckia and Salvias to mention a few.

Neighbourhood Planning Update

Parishioners will no doubt be aware that the Government's Localism Act hands down new powers to local town/village communities in respect of the future development of their locality. Our community, under the auspices of the Parish Council, has the option to create a group to work on a Neighbourhood Plan for Little Hadham. During the summer it was agreed at a meeting that Little Hadham should go ahead and prepare such a plan in readiness for any development which eventually may come our way. A follow up meeting was held on Monday 17th September when Little Hadham Neighbourhood Planning Group met to debate how it should proceed, on behalf of our village community, with drawing up a twenty year development plan for Little Hadham. At present the group is in its infancy and although the task ahead is not too onerous the group is already very conscious that it is working on behalf of all parishioners and that any decisions arrived at by the group over residential, business & social development will eventually have to be supported by the local community. Over the coming months the group will create a Neighbourhood Plan which will need to be robust enough to stand up to scrutiny by the Local Authority and eventually be voted upon by parishioners by way of a referendum. The group's ultimate aim is to produce a fair & balanced village wide plan to be adopted by EHDC, which will sit along side the EHDC Local Development Plan and which furthermore will have a bearing on the type of development our village will be subject to in the future. The group next meets on Monday Oct 15th at Little Hadham School @ 7.30pm - please join us we need a community audience everyone is very welcome! More info available via email: cam2403@hotmail.co.uk

Help Design our Council Tax Support Scheme

East Herts Council is facing some tough choices over who will receive help towards their council tax in the future and before a final decision is taken the council is seeking your views.

At the moment the government sets the rules for council tax benefits and councils decide individual cases within those rules. From next April the council will set the rules as well.

Within these new rules the government has told councils they must continue to support pensioners as they do now. But for people of working age, councils can make changes that suit their local area, while having regard to those who are vulnerable. This will affect anyone of working age who qualifies for council tax benefit.

The government is planning to reduce its spending on support for council tax by 10%. It will contribute only 90% of what the existing scheme is costing, towards the new scheme. If the council does nothing, then council tax payers would see a £700,000 increase in their overall tax bill. That's because East Herts, the county council and the Police Authority would be forced to put up the rate of council tax – or cut other services.

Currently, some claimants get all their council tax paid through benefits. In future every working age claimant will be expected to pay the first 10% of their council tax bill. (For single people this will be after deducting the current 25% discount.) The remaining 90% may then be subject to a discount and potentially all the 90% might be discounted which would leave nothing further to be paid other than the first 10%.

We want to hear your comments on the proposals. You can complete the online questionnaire at www.eastherts.gov.uk/ctsupportscheme by 30/10/12. The council will consider all the responses and agree its final proposals by January 31 2013.

Little Hadham Conservation Society Update

Folks most of you will recall that some three or so years ago a group of parishioners formed LHCS. One of the most important issues facing Little Hadham at the time was the possible allocation of accommodation for gypsies & travellers on two fields on the A120 near Little Hadham School. With the backing of the community LHCS attended several external meetings and put forward the case that "the need for accommodation for gypsies & travellers in Little Hadham was not and had never in the past been established". Indeed hitherto a need for such accommodation remains unchanged, in fact of late the matter has sat on the back burner and LHCS has had no news to report to the contrary.

LHCS recently held a meeting where it was decided that the society should be kept in place, at least for the foreseeable future. We should like to reiterate that the likelihood of gypsies & travellers needing to live in Little Hadham seems apparently very low but for the sake of prudence LHCS will remain in place.

LHCS would also like to confirm that any monies held in its bank account are still intact and shall remain so for the foreseeable future.

Rural Ramblings

With the bulk of the farm work recently completed, the sun shining and the forecast good, we threw some clothes into our motor home and left for an impromptu few days away. Our destination, the north Norfolk coast.

It would appear that the small caravan sites were all still fully booked though schools were back. But this area seems to be for 'oldies' and they (we!) were out in strength. But we did find one place which could take us. It was, quite literally, in the middle of nowhere. Single track farm roads led us the tortuous route to it. We just managed to swing the 30ft beast into the entrance.

Lungworms!

Slugs and snails and puppy dogs tails – there is a worrying increase in the number of cases of dogs being infected with the potentially fatal Lungworm, by eating slugs and snails. The symptoms are Coughing : Tiring easily : Nosebleeds : Poor appetite : Diarrhoea : Vomiting : Seizures.

Speak to your vet about preventative treatments available. The key is to take action early. Keep your garden and surrounding areas as free as possible from dog mess, as this can harbour the lungworms parasite. Humans cannot become infected with Lungworm.

At last, some good weather which has brought about an increase in insect activity throughout the parish, whilst also encouraging some migrant birds to stay put for a week or two longer than normal. Also, some very late records of birds still breeding, especially local goldfinches.

On the bird front, I found time for several long walks around the parish and recorded good birds. The resident barn owls are still to be seen hunting over fields east of Hadham Hall, and little grebes and tufted duck can be found on the lagoon there. On 3rd September I recorded over 15 chiffchaffs and 9 willow warblers migrating through this area, some resting in the willows. A photo here of one of the willow warblers. Also seen on this walk: nuthatch, sparrow hawk, red kite and plenty of linnets. A goldcrest was heard in Chapel Lane on the 5th and bullfinches were present along the Valley Fields footpath.



Several away days were taken to coincide with mass migration. On 10th Sept. I spent the day visiting several sites along the North Norfolk coast, recording a pleasing 89 species including a few rarities. Of particular interest; a pectoral sandpiper. This is a small wader that will



have migrated across the Atlantic from North America. Whilst on an American note, I also saw another American wader, also having travelled over the pond, a short billed dowitcher, only the 2nd UK record. This was at Lodmoor, near Weymouth, Dorset. Finally on this theme I came across a monarch butterfly at Portland Bill, shown here, which also will have made the long journey from the East coast of

were seen whilst I spent several days staying at Portland Bill bird observatory. Plenty of time watching seabirds migrating along the channel, including shearwaters, skuas, a few auks and fulmars.

Back in the garden, new moths for the year keep being recorded, with the garden total now approaching 250 species. Butterflies have been in good numbers around garden buddleia. A photo here of a typically colourful autumnal moth, a sawfly, taken on the 18th Sept.

At home, red admirals, commas and small tortoiseshell have been evident and a solitary brimstone was found on the footpath near Stone House Farm.

Over the next month I shall continue to monitor the local area for migrants, as birds from Scandinavia begin to trickle through the East coast, with some making the journey, roughly from The Wash to the Isle of Wight. In particular black tailed godwits, whimbrel and smaller waders are known to use this as their migration path, so worth keeping an eye on the lagoon and any muddy patches in grassy fields. Finally, 6 yellow wagtails in amongst 50+ pied wagtails were found in a horse field at Bury Green. The yellow is a summer visitor and these will have been on their migration route to sub-Saharan Africa.

If Stansted does in fact come back into the frame SSE will be fighting this with as much commitment and determination as in the past.

SSE welcomes Independent Aviation Connectivity Commission (10.9.12)

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) has welcomed the Government's decision to establish an independent commission to look at aviation connectivity issues. Commenting, Chairman Peter Sanders said: "We are obviously disappointed that the Government is not simply adhering to the policy which it laid down at the beginning of this Parliament, that there should be no more runways in the south-east. But it has been clear for some time now that, in response to heavy lobbying by the aviation industry, it was about to review this policy, and it has also been clear that in this review all possibilities were going to be open for consideration, including expansion at Stansted. This weakening of the Government's position is regrettable, indeed deplorable. But given this background we welcome the appointment of an independent commission that will, we hope, examine the evidence and the arguments in a comprehensive and objective way. There have been three independent assessments in the past, and all of them have concluded that there should not be any more runways at Stansted.

- In the early 1960s the Chelmsford Inquiry under Inspector Blake concluded that a major airport at Stansted would be 'a calamity for the neighbourhood'.
- In the late 1960s and early 1970s the Roskill Commission tried to find the best site for a major airport, and concluded that eight other sites were more suitable than Stansted. (In a minority report one member of the Commission recommended Maplin, a recommendation which the Government of the day accepted.)
- In the 1980s Inspector Eyre concluded that an extra runway at Stansted would be 'an unprecedented and wholly unacceptable major environmental and visual disaster'. We have every reason to believe that this new commission will reach the same conclusion."
